
TRIPLE INJUSTICES OF CLIMATE CHANGE

CLIMATE JUSTICE

According to UNDP and UN Special Rapporteur on the Right to Development, climate justice fights for fairness by supporting those most affected by climate change, holding those responsible accountable, and protecting human rights by taking action to reduce, adapt to, repair, and transform the impacts of climate change.

WHAT DOES CLIMATE JUSTICE FOCUS ON?

Climate justice incorporates several facets within it. As described by Schlosberg & Collins, (2014) and Roser & Seidel (2016), it focuses on:

EMPOWERMENT



Supports marginalized communities to take the lead in creating solutions that reflect their unique needs.

REPRESENTATION



Ensures that the voices of vulnerable groups are heard in decision-making processes.

RECOGNITION



Acknowledges the specific experiences and challenges faced by those most affected by climate change.

RIGHT PROTECTION



Advocates for the rights of marginalized communities to access resources and participate in climate action.

EQUITY



Promotes fair distribution of resources and support to ensure all communities can adapt to and mitigate climate impacts.

COLLABORATION



Encourages partnerships between affected communities, governments, and organizations to develop inclusive climate strategies.

SUSTAINABILTY



Fosters solutions that address immediate challenges and contribute long-term environmental and social sustainability.
